- 3 The committee recorded the minutes of the previous Governing Body meeting held on 29th December 2020 and the action taken based on the suggestions given in the meeting. The minutes and the action taken were approved.
- 4 The Chairperson requested the principal to present a report on the activities in the college from the last Governing Body meeting till date.

- 12 The general body ratified the appointment of 44 faculty members based on the sanctioned workload and the body also ratified the resignation of 41 faculty members from the last meeting to till date.
- 13 The Principal also placed on record the minutes of Academic Council, Board of Studies, Statutory and Non – Statutory Committee meetings under autonomous Scheme held during this period.
The committee recorded the minutes.
- 14 The Principal also presented the results of the Semester Examination held during April/May 2021 which was conducted through online mode.
The results were recorded.
- 15 The Revised Curriculum Structure is designed with 4000 marks with 140 credits for UG and 2250 Marks with 90 credits for PG.
- 16 As per Bharathiar University circular dated 04.10.2021, the distribution of Continuous Internal Assessment and End Semester Examination is changed as 50 : 50 ratio instead of 40: 60 ratio for both theory, practical and project be approved.
- 17 The Continuous Internal Assessment Minimum pass mark for UG and PG is decided and it is decided to give a provision to students to reappear in Internal Examinations if he fails.
- 18 As a part of OBE implementation, the college has introduced revised OBE guidelines (Learning Outcome Curriculum Framework Model) from the academic year 2021-2022 for the students admitted be approved.
- 19 The College conducts both Internal and external audit in the following area:

- 22 The Presentation included the details of scholarships provided by Government, Management and other NGOs.

- 23 Covid Special Welfare measure given by the management for students, faculty and community was recorded.
- 24 The Outreach Programmes conducted by NSS,NCC,YRC and other clubs on Social Awareness, Health and Hygiene, Cleaning Environment Activities were presented.
- 25 A Feedback mechanism was detailed by the Principal in the presentation. The Mechanism involves collecting feedback from students, parents, alumni, industry HR people and subject experts about the curriculum, teaching learning methodology, evaluation, placements and other facilities. The responses were interpreted statistically and the action taken report was recorded.
- 26 The members of the committee had a detailed discussion about starting of new programmes for the academic year 2022-23 and resolved to apply to the Registrar, Bharathiar University for the starting of the following new programmes :
 - i. **Under Graduate Programmes:**
 - a. B.Sc. (Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning)
- 27 The Presentation included the strategic future plan and the road map of the college. Implementation of NEP, Extension of Autonomy, Academic Credit Banks, Increase Number of Patents and Publications, provide more placement opportunities, establish collaborations with industries and inculcate startup and entrepreneurship culture.
- 28 Dr. K.P Suresh appreciated and asked to implement NEP 2020 and Academic Credit Banks. He also suggested to consolidate the village adoption activities under UBA Scheme and also submit it to the Prime Minister's Office for National recognition.
- 29 Dr.N.Jeyakumar appreciated the introduction of New Programme as the need of the hour and also encouraged the initiative for ONE CARD FOR ALL policy.
- 30 Mr.Nandha Kumar appreciated the move on collaboration with industries for IET.
- 31 Mr.E.K.Kumaresan insisted on starting training centers of IAS,IPS and Banking Sectors.
- 32 Mr.Jayakumar Ramdass appreciated and suggested to extend alumni connect. He suggested the mentoring of five students with one alumnus and also to involve in Bharathiar University Glue Grant Project.
- 33 Mr. K.Adithya suggested creatingan Online repository for the study materials given during pandemic period.
- 34 The Chairperson suggested that the next Governing Body meeting will be held in February/March 2022.
- 35 The meeting concluded with vote of thanks by Dr. K. Sundararaman, Member & CEO, Sri Krishna Institutions.

The college offers progressive education to the students in a holistic manner. The College, which began with a meagre strength of students in 1997, has seen a steady growth in students' strength over the years, and now it has more than 8094 students pursuing **32 UG Programmes, 12 PG Programmes**, one Integrated Programme and **8 Research Programmes**.

1.4 Institution Innovation Cell (IIC)

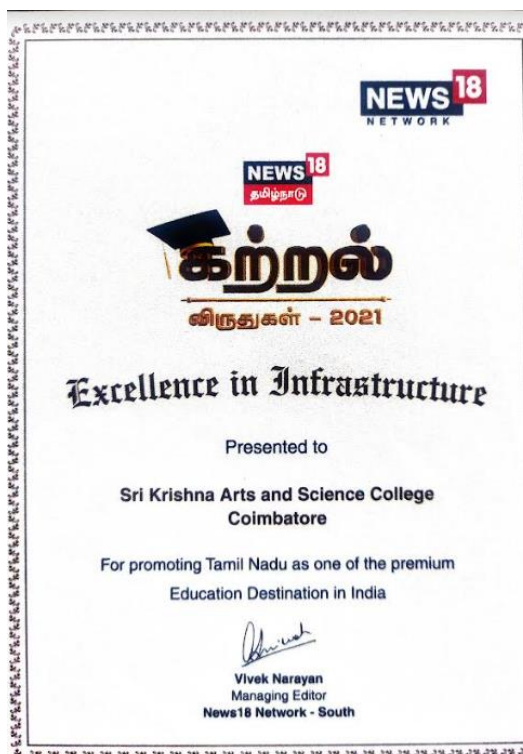

5. Curriculum Enrichment

5.1 Outcome Based Education

Outcome Based Education is a transformation of “teacher centric” to “student centric”. OBE focusses on what students can actually do after they are taught and expect all learners to achieve particular level of knowledge and abilities. OBE is a revolution from memorising facts to application in a situation.

Requisites of LOCF Framework based on OBE

- Learning process need to be clearly identified
- Students’ progress is based on the demonstrated achievement
- Multiple instructional and assessment strategies need to be available in order to meet the demands and needs of the student
- Adequate time and assistance need to be provided to make the student realize full potential.

Benefits of LOCF Framework based on OBE

- More directed and coherent curriculum structure
- Industry relevant Graduates
- Continuous Quality Improvement as an inevitable process

Therefore, OBE can be achieved through the learning outcomes.

5.2 Regulations in drafting OBE in Curriculum

Stage 1 Stakeholder and Benchmarking Report

Once the need and market analysis of the programme has been reported through adequate stakeholder analysis, the next step is to determine the Programme Educational Objectives.

Stage 2 Programme Educational Objectives

The Programme Educational Objectives should be determined based on the mission and vision statement of the Institution. There can be 3-5 Programme Educational Objectives for a Programme. Broad statements that describe the student’s career and professional accomplishments within 5 years upon graduation. These are the statements that describe what the students are expected to know or be able to do by the time they complete an academic degree/qualification. The programme educational objectives are different from the students’ learning outcomes in four ways, 1.Degree of specificity 2. Role of constituents Purpose of assessment 4. Cycles of data collection. Once the Programme

Educational Objectives should be mapped against the mission and vision of the Institution.

Stage 3 Programme Learning Outcomes

The programme learning outcomes should be determined based on the graduate attributes or the skills. These Programme Learning Outcomes should be mapped against the Programme Educational Objectives and the blooms taxonomy of verbs. The abilities (Cognitive, Psychomotor and Affective) that a student should be able to demonstrate at the time of graduation. Therefore, Programme learning outcomes are a description of knowledge, competencies, and values a student display at the time of completion of graduation.

The Three Domains of Learning

The Three domains of learning are 1. Cognitive (thinking from the head) 2. Affective domain (executing from heart) 3. Psychomotor (the movements of hands and legs)

a. Cognitive: This is a mental process involved in thinking, gaining knowledge and comprehension. There are six categories and levels under Cognitive domain.

C1-Remembering

C2-Understanding

C3-Applying

C4-Analysing

C5-Evaluating

C6- Creating

b. The affective domain includes the manner in which we deal things emotionally, such as feelings, enthusiasm, motivation, values, appreciation, attitudes etc., There are five levels of learning under this domain

A1-Receiving Phenomena

A2-Responding to Phenomena

A3-Valuing

A4-Organisation

A5-Internalising value

c. Psychomotor Domain: the psychomotor domain includes physical movement, coordination and use of motor skill areas. Development of these skills requires practice and it is measured in terms of speed, precision, distance, procedures, or techniques in execution. There are seven levels of learning.

P1-Perception (awareness)

P2-Set

P3-Guided response

P4-Mechanism

P5-Complex Overt Response

P6-Adaptation

P7-Origination

Stage 4 Course Learning Outcomes

Depending upon the graduate attributes and the mapping of Programme Learning Outcomes, the Course Learning Outcomes will be framed. The Course Learning outcome should definitely follow the Blooms Taxonomy of verbs. Specific statements of what the students are expected to achieve at the end of the course. These statements are central to course curriculum which is measurable, observable and clearly indicates what a student should know and be able to do as a result of learning. The course learning outcome should satisfy the following condition.

- Each course will address three to four CLO statements
- Should be mapped to the learning domains of Blooms or other Taxonomy of verbs
- There should be one to one mapping with the CLO and PLO statement. i.e One CLO should be mapped with One PLO
- Expressed in terms of measurable and achievable
- There should be an action Verb + Standard or Verb + Condition or Verb + Standard + Condition.
- Multiple PLO, CLO and taxonomy of verbs should not be reflected in a single CLO statement.

Step 5 Constructive Alignment of teaching methodologies and Assessment

There should be constructive alignment of teaching methodologies and assessment procedure. The assessment should be evaluated through Rubrics and appropriate marking scheme should be provided.

Stage 6 Curriculum Documentation

After the fixation of students learning time and the credit fixation. The final curriculum should be documents and approved by the Academic council.

Stage 7 Implementation with evidences

The Curriculum document should be appropriately documented and relevant evidences on the methodology of learning and assessment procedures need to be recorded. Relevant evidences pertaining to Lesson Plan, Course plan, Test Blue print, Assessment Rubrics and evaluation, should be classified in accordance with the Level of Blooms.

Stage 8 Evaluation

The CLO-PLO attainment of the students collectively for a module as well as individual attainment should be recorded and presented through a report. This report should be presented in the Annual Programme Monitoring Report as well as in Module Monitoring Report. This will provide an insight to the institution in closing the gap in the curriculum. The gaps will be informed to the curriculum review committee and the process will continue further.

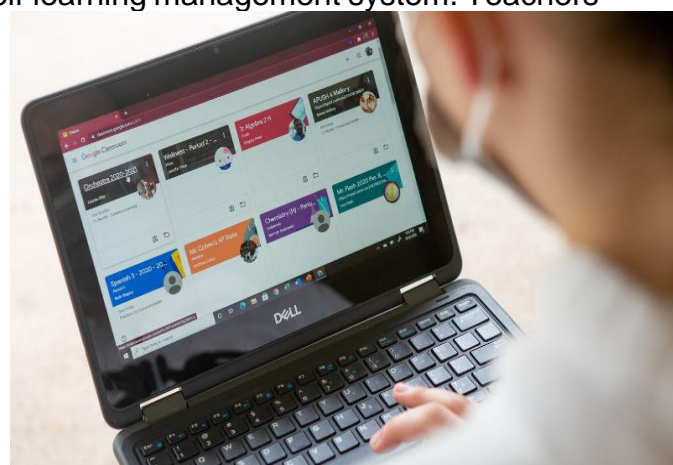
6. Teaching and Learning

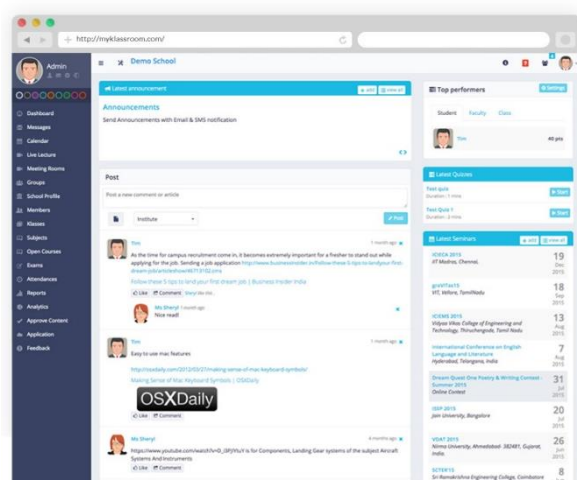

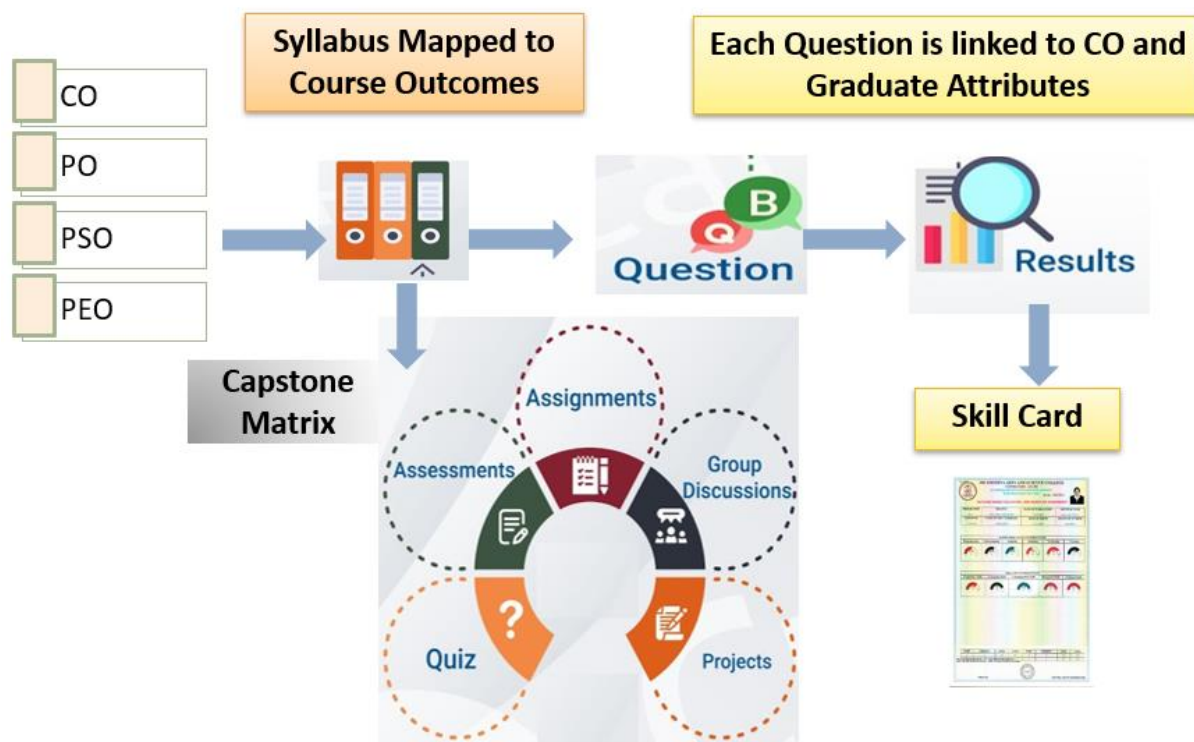
Value added courses were offered to the students. These courses were utilised by them at the maximum and it helps to enrich their knowledge.

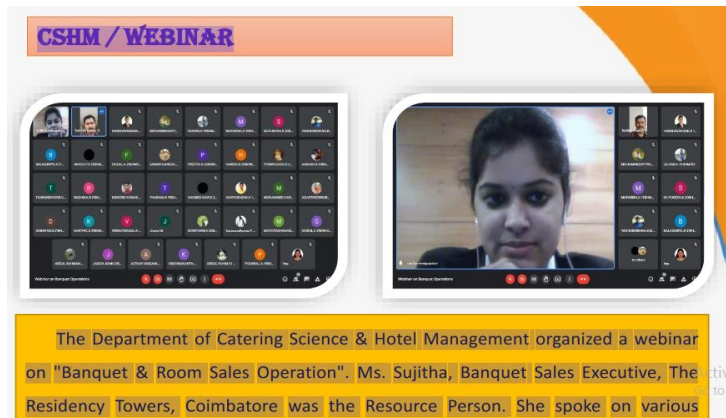
12. Events Organized

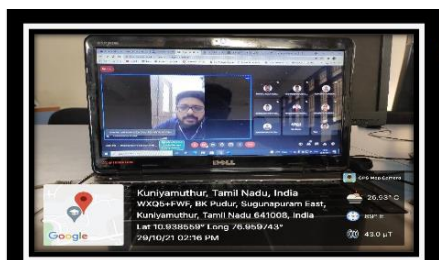

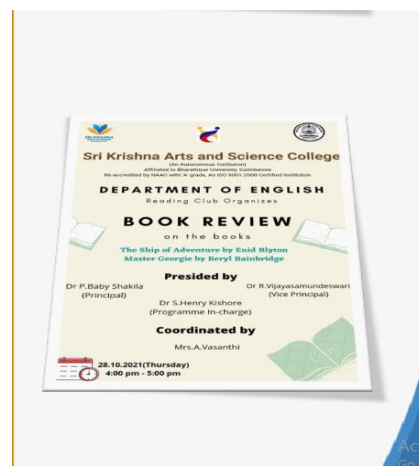

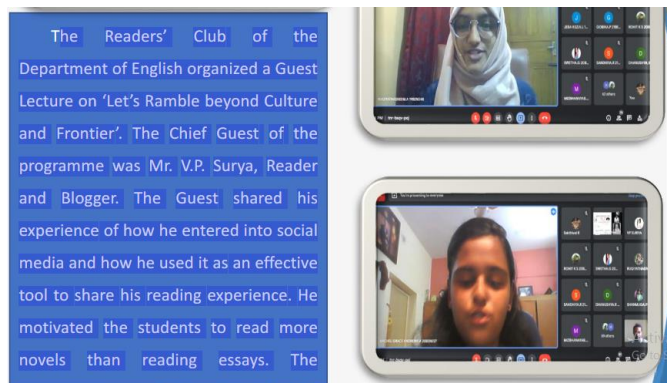

14. Feedback

“Every desire is quenched to make an individual person”

The college exemplifies various platforms to impart knowledge and ethics of life to make the students to meet the growing demands of the future. The measures for improving the standards in academics are well augmented by the advice of syllabus expertise committee, alumni and HR. Similarly, the syllabus has been restructured and remodelled on a fashion to merge with practical approach. The curriculum has been modelled on empirical methods as students and parents’ desire are found to be in need of the realistic study. The syllabus implementation proves to be relevant to match with the job requirements. The implemented learning platforms of ICT like Myclassroom, google classrooms are already functioning as the scope of employability challenges in every aspect of the work field. As the members of the board of studies advice, the chairmen of different boards take the proper redressal of suggestions to help the students to enhance their life skills. The following actions are prominently taken to improvise the standards as suggested by members of the board, alumni, academic review with parents’:

1. Creating placements opportunities for students by making frequent industrial visit to imbibe the nuances of job skills
2. Students mentoring system monitors each step of the students as the undergraduate students face the challenges in choosing the path of their interest
3. Students are given with career-oriented counselling and lectures recurrently.
4. ICT learning is the foremost steps of the college which fulfils the knowledge of technological oriented
5. Various hands-on training is instilled on par with industrial demands
6. Slow learners are given attention to what their expectations to be and they are given training with hand on programmes
7. Advanced learners and average learners are meant to be using both practical and theoretical study
8. Imparting soft skills programmes to enrich life-skill study
9. Faculty development programmes are conducted to strengthen their mental well being
10. Students’ cognitive skills are empowered by the nuances of student-centric approach.

15. Academic, Administration and Green Audit

For enhancing the quality education and progression of SKASC, the institution maintains a centralized audit system which is conducted both internally and externally. Once in the end of the semester the audit team will carry out audit procedures in the following areas.

- Academic Audit
- Administration Audit
- Financial Audit
- Green Audit

Internal Audit will be conducted at the end of every semester. The internal audit team will verify the academic documents as per the check list which covers both Academic and Administrative procedures. All the departments, Principal Office, Controller of Examination Office, Library, Placement, Maintenance Office and Laboratories will be audited. Stock verification in the library, stores and laboratories will also be done. After conducting the audit, the observations are submitted as a report to the Principal. The Principal will discuss the audit report with Heads of the Departments during the Heads Meeting. External Audit will be planned by the end of the academic year for two days.

The financial statements/annual reports are audited internally by the professional auditor at least once a year. The internally audited statement further will be audited by an external auditor and will be recorded for filing returns. Periodical internal audit carried over in the finance department from time to time to ensure the transactions are evident with proper records and receipts. Consolidation of these statements will be presented during the annual internal audit. The collective report from the internal audit will be submitted during the external audit. Any non-settled disputes or discrepancies will be notified to the external auditor and follow the guidelines provided in the company's act as well the auditor's judgment. During the annual general meeting of the organisation, the external auditor's report will be projected and appropriate measures will be recommended to the senior management in terms of compliance, performance appraisal, discontinuation of a particular operation and cost-benefit analysis for decision-making.

To balance Eco-friendly resources in the built-in campus area, the college conducts periodic environment and energy audits every year. The internal audit committee executes the audit and the report will be submitted to external certified auditors.

16. Student Support Systems

16.1 Academic Review Meeting (ARM)

Sri Krishna Arts and Science College organizes Academic Review Meeting (ARM) twice in a semester wherein the parents of our students get to meet the teachers. ARMs play an integral role in students' education and it sets the tone for an effective Parent-Teacher partnership that can make a significant difference in students' education. ARMs provide an opportunity to refine students' individual learning plan and to make sure the roles of teachers, students and parents.



16.2 Tutor-Ward System

Tutorial sessions enrich the teaching-learning process by focusing on smaller groups and catering to the individual needs of the students. The tutor probes a student's understanding and pushes him or her to think through topics in much greater depth than is the norm in a classroom or lecture setting. This system of learning involves an intense interaction between the student and his/ her teacher. The diverse activities conducted during the tutorial sessions enable the students to showcase their talents, boost up their confidence, and also provide a welcome break from the fixed routine and curriculum.



16.3 Class Committee Meeting

The Class Committee Meeting is to focus and to enhance the class's performance in academics and to solve the students' issues regarding the classes.

competitions were based on Math Rangoli and Mind calculation. The first-year students from various departments actively participated in it.

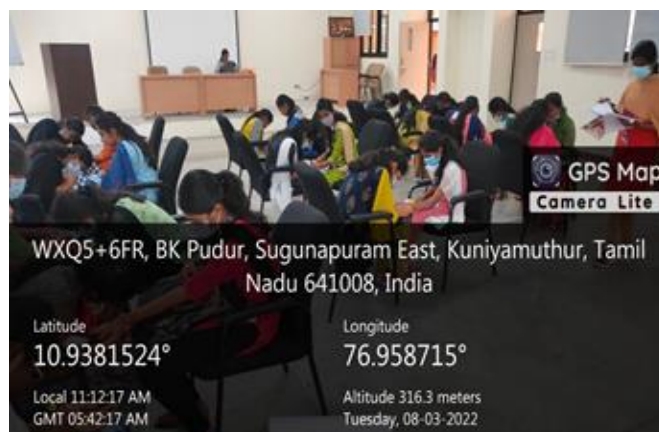


International Women's Day

Following are the instruments introduced in the system of the evaluation of the teaching- learning process.

23.1.3 Rubrics

A rubric for assessments, also called as scoring guide is a tool for interpreting and grading students on any kind of work against criteria and standards. An assessment rubric provides the means to increase objectivity in assessment and reduce subjectivity. It presents a clear expectation on the assessments and relates it to the learning outcomes, ensures consistency, transparency and fairness in the marking process across course instructors for the same assessment type, effectively grades or marks many assessments for a large group of students; defines clear guidance for moderation and provides more objective data for analytics.

23.1.4 Test Blue Print

A construction plan for a test containing the details about the content should be included in the test. This blue print act as content validity and ensures the achievement of the learning outcomes. This test blue print acts as consistent and equivalent across different semesters and years before the end of the cycle.

A two-way table is designed to include all the learning topics and levels of Blooms taxonomy should be reflected in the test blueprint. A Test Blue print is developed after the completion of the Curriculum design and before a draft question paper is constructed.

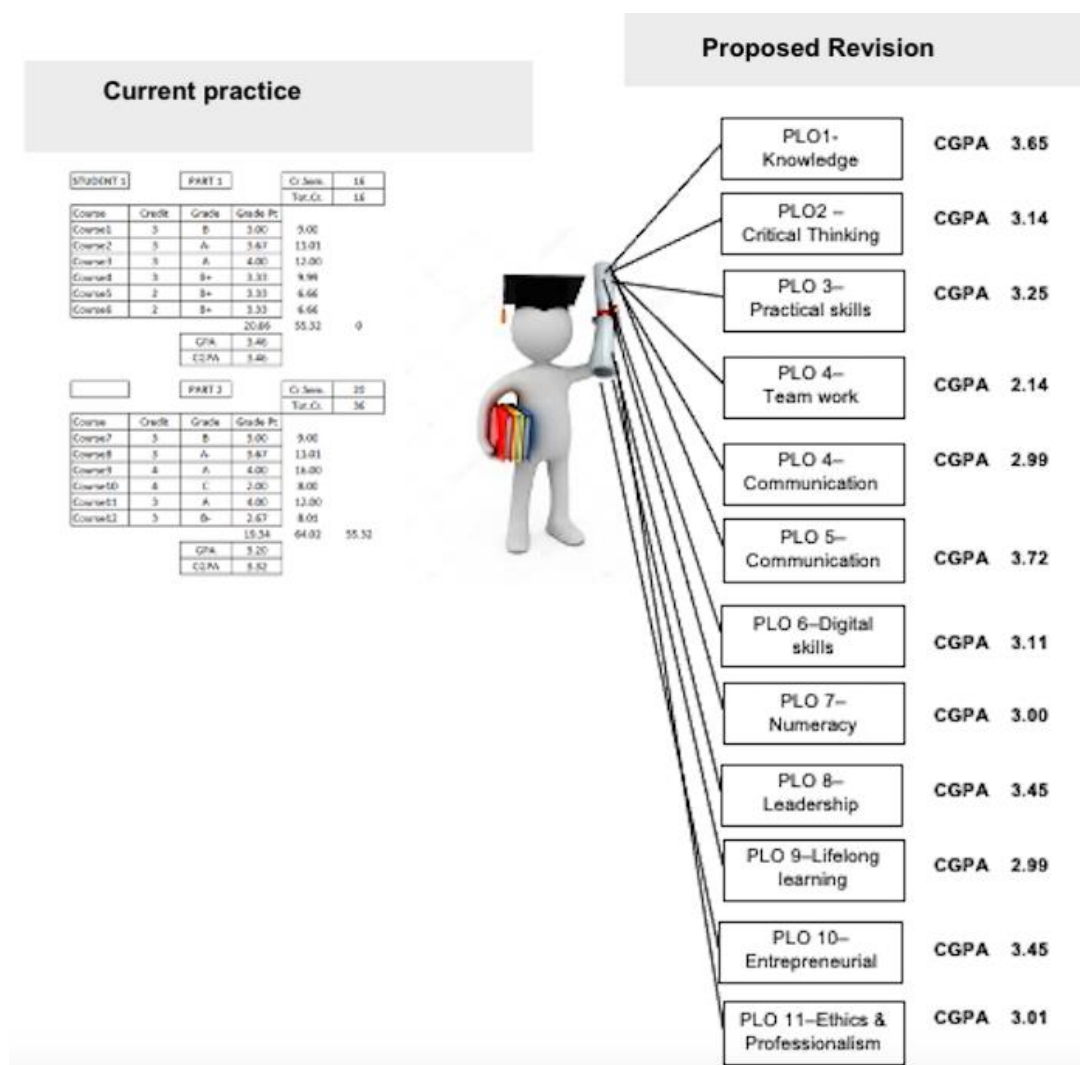


Fig 23.1.5 CGPA transformation and skill attainment pertaining to individual PLO's

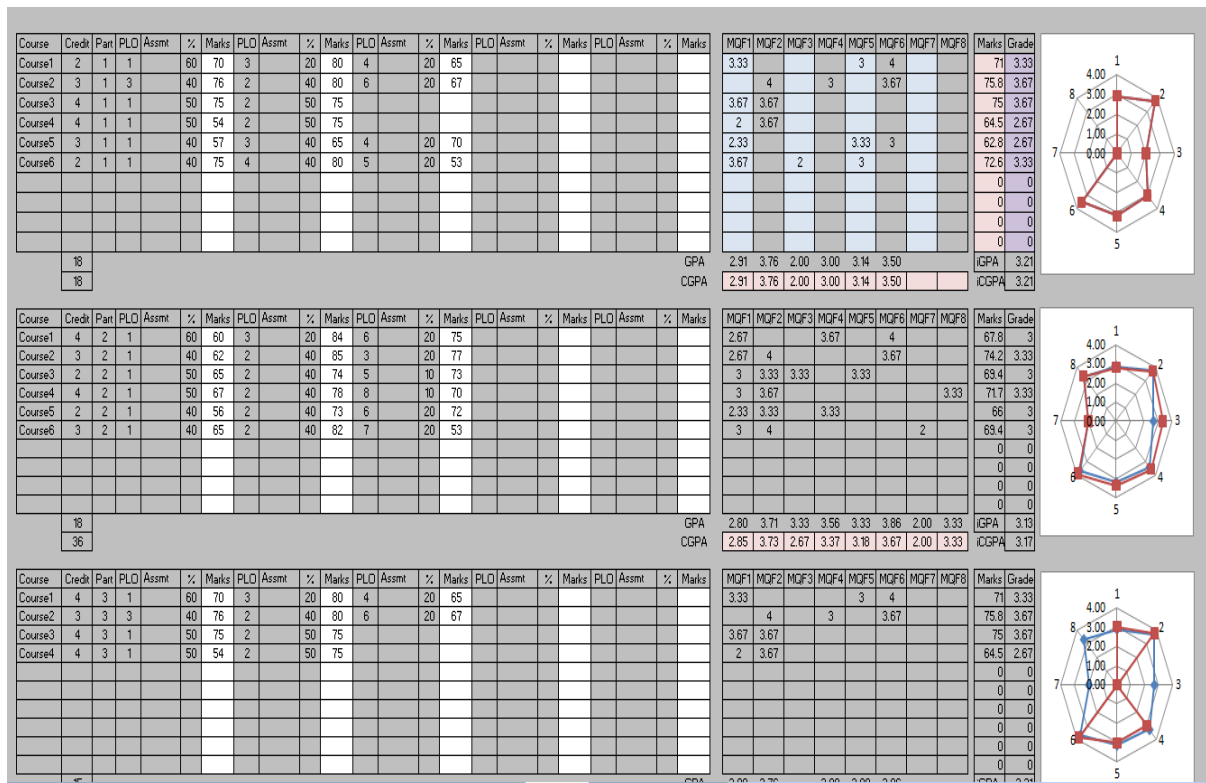
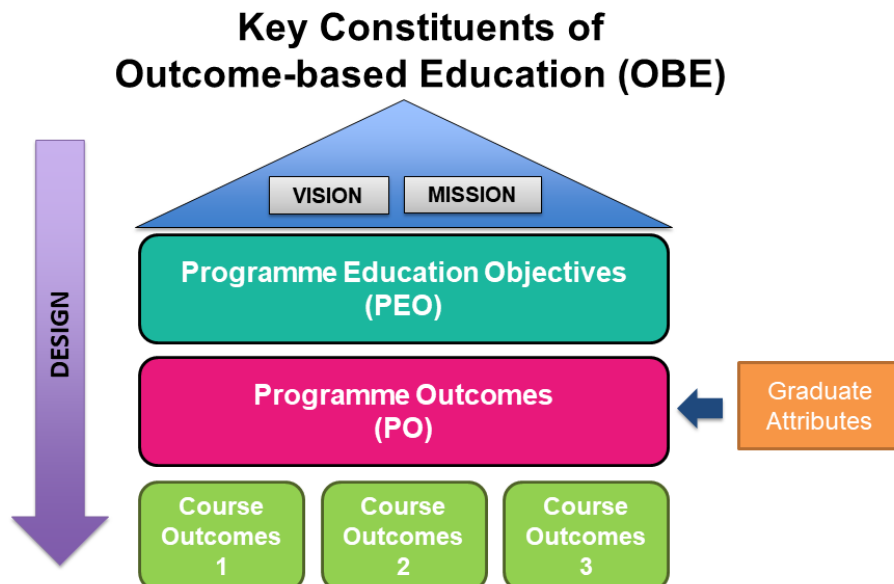


Fig 23.1.6 Spider Diagram- Individual attainment

Mission

- To augment the productivity in research through a conducive environment.
- To encourage collaborative partnership across industry, government, community-based organizations, and agencies at the local, national and International levels.
- To facilitate and provide greater access to research through mobilization of resources and funding.

This handbook is intended to provide the essential information to the academicians and the research scholars. The College reserves the right to revise/amend the rules/regulations/procedures. It is the responsibility of the candidates to make themselves familiar with the rules and regulations and to understand that any breaches may lead to disciplinary action and may disrupt the study of the candidates.

The handbook is designed to assist students, research supervisors and professional staff in interpreting relevant University and College regulations, linking to relevant policies and procedures published on the SKASC website.

Objective of this Handbook

This document includes guidelines for managing research and development activities at SKASCC as well as the roles and responsibilities of the academic staff in

terms of their engagement in this matter. Accordingly, the objectives of this document are to:

- maintain a multi-disciplinary research culture among lecturers and students;
- balance between teaching and research activities;
- disseminate research and development output through publications;
- promote participation in conferences, seminars, workshops and exhibitions;
- develop SKASC Research and Development roadmap for high impact and niche areas of research activities.

Expected Outcomes

- SKASC realizes the significant contribution of research and development to the academic world. It encourages the maintenance of high standards of research and educational development. In this respect, the Centre desires the sharing of new ideas for the benefit of not only the lecturers and students but also the global society. Hence, SKASC expects every lecturer to contribute his/her knowledge, skills and experience to enhance and grow in his/her respective discipline. Such involvement will help create research and learning environment comprising diverse research disciplines and development activities.
- To this end, the RDC policies and procedures have been formulated to facilitate academic lecturers and researchers to participate in research activities including publications. In this regard, there is also the availability of seed grant to encourage the researchers to carry out local research projects and activities.

Research Advisory Council Responsibilities

RAC is responsible for ensuring that these policies are complied with and implemented.

The roles of RAC include to:

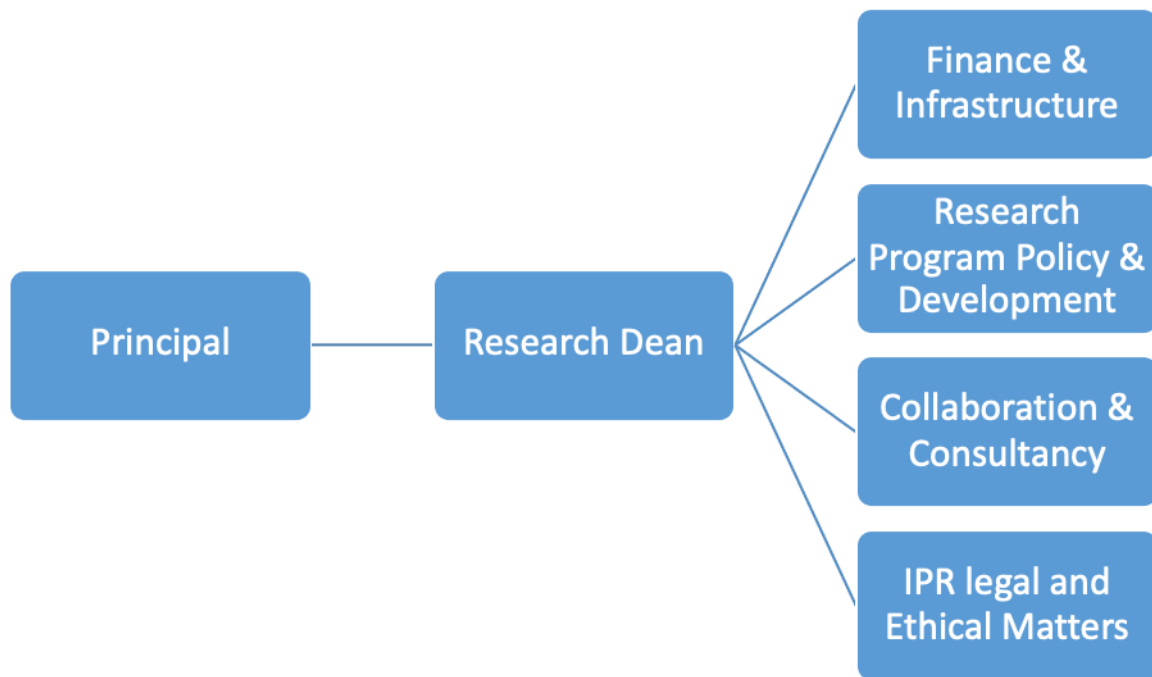
- Receive and compile applications from researchers and present application report to RAC committee for evaluation and / or approval.
- Coordinate and facilitate writing of research proposal for submission to external parties.
- Assist, promote and disseminate research opportunities and output to local and external parties.
- Encourage and support creativity and innovation initiatives among staff

Research Advisory Council (RAC)

Governance

The Research Advisory Council (RAC) is headed by the principal as the apex body of Center for Research, SKASC. The Director/Dean of research will act as the convenor for the Research Advisory Council. There are four committee to drive the governance of RAC.

Research Committee 1: Finance and Infrastructure

This committee will look after the Grants and Funds management. This committee will look into the Capacity Building programmes. They will also facilitate the corpus for research and development from Government, Industry and other funding agencies and channelize Corporate Social Responsibility funds for sustenance and furtherance of research activities. This committee will need to liaise with funding provision for research in the annual budget subject to the availability of funds. The updation of research facilities will also be taken care of by this committee.

Research Committee 2: Research Programme Policy and Development

This committee will monitor the research programme as well as in developing the research programme policy in line with the National Missions, SDGs, Start-up India etc.,

This committee will form Research Clusters to bring all the researchers, faculty, students, scholars to add a synergistic advantage in finding multi-disciplinary, trans-disciplinary and inter-disciplinary areas.

Research Committee 3: Collaboration and Community

This Committee will look after the networking and collaborative research with other Institutions at the national and International levels. They should be able to reach out the key industry players, research organizations, Institutions, associations, NGOs, government bodies to forge strategic partnerships.

Research Committee 4: IPR, Legal and Ethical Matters

This committee will ensure that the researchers understand the importance of integrity, ethics, comply with ethical codes of research and publishing practices at Institutional, national and global level. Plagiarism and Sensitization the research community about dubious research and publishing in predatory journal will be an additional area for this committee.

Role of Research Committees

The main role of the Committees is to develop and formulate research strategies, guidelines, policies, initiatives and innovations that promote the research interests of SKASC. The Committee shall take all reasonable and appropriate steps to:

- monitor the progress of research activities
- advise and formulate recommendations to SKASC of critical issues related to research and commercialisation;
- advise the management on the allocation and use of recurrent internal funds supporting research and commercialisation;
- evaluate applications from researchers and evaluate applications for commercialisation

Terms and Abbreviations

Certain terms and abbreviations are used in this document with specific meanings, as defined in this section. For the purpose of this document:

1. **‘Research’** refers to the systematic and disciplined activity undertaken to create and advance knowledge.
2. **‘Research Group’** refers to a group of people who are doing researches.
3. **‘Researcher’** refers to academicians who conduct research work.

4. **‘Staff’** refers to any person or employee employed by SKASC either on temporary, contract or permanent bases.
5. **‘Commercialisation’** refers to the conversion of ideas into tangible products, services, processes, or organised systems that can be marketed through licensing, sales, spin-off, or joint venture companies.
6. **‘Innovation’** refers to the creation and implementation of any kind of processes, products, services or new ways of delivery that can provide a significant improvement on results, efficiency, effectiveness or quality.
7. **‘Confidential Information’** refers to any confidentiality of documents protected under the law, and owned by SKASC.
8. **‘Expenses’** refers to all the necessary and reasonable expenses incurred in the research and development as well as intellectual property, including patent and other intellectual property filing, registration and legal fees, intellectual property insurance premium, maintenance fees, marketing and licensing costs, administrative expenses and fixed overhead costs and any other incidental expenses incurred during commercialization of the intellectual property (IP).
9. **‘Fund’** refers to any fund provided by the Government of India or any agencies or organizations for research and development, acquisition, pre- commercialisation and commercialisation of Intellectual Property.
10. **‘Resources’** refers to both intangible and tangible resources, including the physical, reputation and image, time, financial, technology, intellectual and human capital resources.
11. **‘RAC’** refers to the Research Advisory Council of Sri Krishna Arts and Science College.
12. **“SKASC”** is an abbreviation of Sri Krishna Arts and Science College
13. **‘SOPs’** is an abbreviation of Standard Operating Procedures.
14. **‘R&D’** is an abbreviation of Research and Development.
15. **‘RG’** is an abbreviation of Research group.
16. **‘IP’** is an abbreviation of Intellectual Property.

Objectives

- To Foster research culture and provide required support through standard guidelines.
- To create effective support system to facilitate the faculty and researchers in their specialized area of research
- To collaborate and extend synergistic partnership through potential collaborators and Industries to promote research.

- To act as a liaison between the researchers and funding agencies in the preparation and submission of research proposals.
- To develop Institutional Research Information system for sharing the status of ongoing/completed research projects/ programmes
- To coordinate with the other centers of SKASC dealing with University-Industry Inter Linkage, Incubation, Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development and Intellectual Property Rights (IPRs).
- To serve as nodal center for the promotion of ideation and conceptualization of research topics/themes by organizing workshops and training programs.
- To ensure integrity and ethical practices in research activities.
- To establish start-ups and IPR Cells

Research Advisory Committee Functions

- The frequency of the meeting will be twice in a year to formulate research strategy and research progress.
- The committee monitors the progress of the registered Ph.D and M.Phil research scholars.
- The committee promotes collaborative interdisciplinary research projects with National and International Universities.
- The Committee formulate strategies to increase the research publication in high impact journals.
- The RAC closely monitors the research clusters
- The RAC reviews the physical and financial utilization of the sanctioned projects.

Code of Ethics in Research

The Center for Research at SKASC follows the code of ethics in setting the general principles of ethical conduct in research activities. The code of conduct are in line with the vision and mission of the Institution.

The faculties of the Institution have commitment in pursuing the research to the promotion of public interest as well as in the community development. At SKASC we uphold the vision and mission of the institution in abiding with the integrity and ethical standards in the eyes of public and public interest. All the research interest of SKASC will be directed towards dissemination and transfer of knowledge and enhance reliability and validity in the best interest of community.

All Faculties, Students and Scholars of SKASC should fulfil the obligations and responsibilities as stated below:

- The research activities should not be “Plagiarized” and the authors should be given due acknowledgement through citations.
- Confidentiality of the sources need to be respected and information of the respondents should not be revealed.
- Assure on the correctness and accuracy of the data has been provided in the research results and discussion and duly published.
- Safety practices should be followed and adhered in all the research procedures and activities.
- Due Diligence should be maintained in handling the equipment's and resources.
- Proper records to be maintained in the fair distribution of legal ownership of the research as well as the commercialization of it product.
- The waste from the laboratory needs to be disposed appropriately and environmental factors should be considered.
- The “Code of Ethics” should be embedded in the curriculum and the students should be made aware of the concepts.
- Any violation pertaining to the code of conduct should be reported immediately to the RAC.

Academic Integrity and Plagiarism Regulations

The committee on IPR, Legal and Ethical matters of Research Advisory Council will form an **Institutional Academic Integrity Panel (IAIP)** and will monitor the Academic Integrity and Plagiarism regulations.

Plagiarism

The candidate must certify that the work has been done by him and has not been submitted elsewhere for the award of any degree or qualification. Proper acknowledgement must be made to the work of others.

Plagiarism includes:

- Unauthorized act of copying/reproducing or attempt to copy an idea, writing or invention of another person.
- Extraction of academic data which are the results of research undertaken by another person, such as laboratory findings, data obtained, whether published or

unpublished, without giving due acknowledgement to the original source.

- Transcription of the ideas of others which are kept in whatever form (written/printed/electronic/slide form) of teaching or research apparatus.
- Unauthorized translation of the writing of another person from one language to another whether wholly or partly.

Responsibilities of Scholars/Academicians:

- always give due acknowledgement to the sources of ideas or data which are not owned by the candidate and are not truly in the public domain;
- be able to distinguish between the candidate's own ideas or work and those of others, as any ambiguity in such a distinction could give rise to a suspicion of plagiarism;
- acknowledge the source of data, analysis or procedures which are not owned by the candidate.
- The candidate has to declare that in the event of any infringement of the provisions of the Copyright Act 1957 whether knowingly or unknowingly, the College shall not be liable for the same in any manner whatsoever and undertakes to indemnify and keep indemnified the College against all such claims and actions.

Software for Detection of Plagiarism

The scholars are required to run the thesis through the plagiarism checking approved by the college. The similarity index for each chapter shall not exceed 10%. Ph.D Candidate shall adopt the regulations on Similarity Checks for Plagiarism, Quantification of Plagiarism, Handling of Plagiarism and Penalties of Plagiarism as stipulated in the **Promotion of Academic Integrity and Prevention of Plagiarism Regulations of Bharathiar University** framed based on the UGC (Promotions of Academic Integrity and Prevention of Plagiarism in Higher Educational Institutions) Regulations 2018. Urkund is used to check the plagiarism of the thesis and Dissertation from Bharathiar University.

Similarity Checks

The Similarity checks for plagiarism shall exclude the following:

- All Quoted works reproduced with prior permission and / or attribution from the concerned authorities.
- All References, Bibliographies, Intext references/Citation, Table of Contents, Preface and Acknowledgements.
- Common words, Generic Terms, Laws, Standard Symbols and Standard Equations.

Acceptable and Non-Acceptable levels of Plagiarism

The Guidelines and regulations are in line with **UGC and Bharathiar University**.

- Minor Similarities- Similarity up to 10%
- Similarity above 10%-40% - Such students shall be asked to submit a revised script within a stipulated time period not exceeding 6 months.
- Similarities above 40%-60%-Such student shall be debarred from submitting a revised script for a period of one year.
- Similarities above 60%-Such student registration for that programme shall be cancelled.

The Regulations as prescribed the **UGC** on detection/Reporting/Handling of Plagiarism to be followed by the Institution:

- If any member of the academic community suspects with appropriate proof that a case of plagiarism has happened in any document, he/she shall report the same to **Institutional Academic Integrity Panel (IAIP)**. Upon receipt of such a complaint or allegations the IAIP shall investigate the matter and submit the recommendation to RAC.
- Any allegations shall be in line with the principles of natural justice against the student/faculty/researcher and staff.
- The IAIP has the power to assess the level of plagiarism and recommend the penalty(ies) accordingly.

Ethical Committee

To strengthen the research activities and to maintain the codes of ethics, the research ethical committee has been established with a multi-disciplinary composition catering to the various requirements. This committee will address both the Human and Animal Ethics.

Composition

Principal- Research Ethics Head and Chairperson

Objectives

- Experiments will be performed by and under the supervision of a person duly qualified personnel in the said discipline.
- To ensure quality and consistency in following the ethical guidelines of the national policies.
- To follow the regulations of parent University (Bharathiar) and UGC regarding the ethical policies and governance.
- In case of experiments pertaining to animals, due care with humanity will be involved in performing the experiments .
- Experiments on larger animals are avoided when it is possible to achieve the same results by experiments upon small laboratory animals.
- Experiments are not performed merely for the purpose of acquiring manual skills.
- Animals intended for the performance of experiments are properly looked after before and after the experiments.
- Appropriate records are maintained with respect to experiments performed on animals.
- The ethics pertaining to animals will be strictly under the description of “ Breeding of and Experiments on Animals (Control and Supervision) Rules, 1998.

Consultancy Policy

One of the major research policy includes Consultancy policy under the Research Advisory Committee. The major commitment is to provide an impact to the society and other stakeholders. Sri Krishna Arts and Science College strives to promote expertise in the areas of research, in this regard consultancy services in academics contributes to the economy of the country by broadening the professional experience and body of knowledge of the teaching fraternity. The Consultancy Policy of SKASC serves as a framework for the stakeholders, the Management, and the academic staff on their roles and responsibilities in the consultancy process. Accordingly, the objectives of this policy are to:

- Establish guidelines and standards for consultancy activities that bear SKASC identity.
- Develop SKASC reputation through consultancy services.
- Provide learning and consultancy opportunities and resources.

- Reinforce SKASC's identity and help raise its profile by ensuring that its name is deservedly acknowledged and highly perceived by the public.

Scope

This policy covers all the processes related to the implementation and management of consultancy activities that are applicable to SKASC staff.

Definition and the Terms Used

- **'Consultancy'** refers to the provision of expert knowledge to a third party for a provisional fee.
- The opinion or advice is rendered exclusively in the interest of the client and can cover reviews, analyses, recommendations and implementation.
- Consultancy activities included in the above definition are as follows:
 - ✓ Consultancy between SKASC and client.
 - ✓ Consultancy between SKASC staff and client.
 - ✓ Consultancy between a company of SKASC's staff and client.
 - ✓ Appointment or acknowledgment to any SKASC academician such as associate research fellow, panel expert, invited speaker, facilitator and other related position.
- **'Staff'** refers to any person or employees appointed by SKASC.
- **'Critical issue'** refers to problems and concerns that could affect SKASC's image and reputation.
- **"Resources"** refers to both intangible and tangible resources, including the physical, reputation and image, time, financial, technology, intellectual and human capital resources.
- **"Consultancy Committee"** refers to a committee established by the Management of SKASC in accordance with its constitution.
- **"Research and Development Centre"** refers to the Centre established by the Management of SKASC.

The Consultancy composition can be included as

- Assignment or Job
- Expert Advice
- Problem Solving
- Targeted Training
- Testing
- Laboratory based experimental work

- Market research and survey
- Corporate Trainings

Faculty members of SKASC involved in consultancy are referred as consultants and the industry seeking consultancy is referred as the beneficiary.

Principles of Consultancy

1. Faculty member can choose their area of expertise for the consultancy work
2. The consultancy should not interfere with the prime job of the consultant.
3. The consultancy services should be undertaken with the prior permission from the SKASC.
4. Two types of consultancy are encouraged
 1. Individual Consultancy- Individual consultancy is offered by a faculty at SKASC in his/her individual capacity.
 2. Institutional Consultancy- In this case the Institutional Consultancy is offered by a team of faculty members from the same discipline or different discipline of SKASC.
5. Any foreign Consultancies will be under the discretion of the management rules and regulations.
6. All the research projects sponsored by the Government (DST, DBT, ICMR, DRDO, etc.,) public, private, national and international agencies, autonomous bodies do not fall under the purview of consultancy services.

General Procedures

- The consultancy proposal should be received by the consultant from the beneficiary
- The proposal should be submitted to the Research Advisory Committee
- The RAC will scrutinize and submit for recommendation to the Management.
- The RAC will consider the following aspects during the scrutiny process:
 - The entire consultancy service or project should be focused on the interest of the Institute.
 - The Consultant prime duties should not be compromised with the beneficiary work.
 - All the issues related to the progress of the working work pertaining to Budget, Time frame should be legally discussed with the competent authorities.
- The Head of the Institution will issue the approval letter after getting the consent of the competent authorities.

- Every staff is required to obtain written approval from the Principal to carry out or be involved in consultancy work.
- In considering approval of an application for consultancy, attention is given to the following matters:
- The consultancy work will not interfere with teaching and other official duties.
- The consultancy work concerned will benefit the staff in the form of broadening and enhancing knowledge and experience in his/her specialized field.
- The concerned faculty is able to complete the consultancy work before compulsory retirement or completion of his/her contract with SKASC.
- Consultancy activities involved by the Consultant(s) must be related to the interest of SKASC.
- The consultancy services must be legal and not in contravention of any law of India.
- Staff member's duty to SKASC shall take priority over the matters in respect of which the authorization is granted.

Responsibility and Accountability

The roles and responsibilities of the consultant are to:

- Implement the consultancy contract according to the terms of the consultancy contract.
- Carry out his/her work with the highest quality output and within the time stipulated.
- Give priority to client satisfaction every time, whether in official communication or in the preparation of report or in any consultancy product as determined.
- Ensure that he/she is adequately covered by appropriate insurance from liabilities arising from the said contract.
- Sign a letter of indemnity with the SKASC regarding any liability arising from any party as a result of inefficiency, carelessness, or wrong-doing of the consultant staff or his/her agent in carrying out the consultancy work.
- Neither neglect his /her public duty for personal importance nor use his /her position as a consultant staff for personal benefit.
- Ensure that, with the exception of the approval from the Consultancy

- Committee, a consultant staff is not allowed to start consultancy or surrender his/her right or sub-contract his/her consultancy work.

Submission of Final Report

After the completion of the consultancy project, the Chief Consultant should submit the Final Report to the Research Advisory Committee.

Internal Seed Grants

Introduction

Research seed funds are intended to support the activities and promote the academicians to the next level of their career. The internal seed funds support activities necessary to advance competitive research proposals among the academicians in enhancing the research culture in the Institution. It is expected that a competitive proposal of social nature that might benefit the Institution towards the growth and development.

Eligibility

All the faculty members employed by the SKASC Institution will be eligible to apply for the Internal seeding grants. An eligible applicant may lead one project as Principal Investigator (PI)

Sourcing and Utilization of Research Fund

The researchers shall secure sufficient funds by themselves to carry out research activities through grant providers.

Grant Providers

- SKASC (Internal-Short term)
- Ministry of Higher Education- UGC
- Other External and International Grants
- Industries
- Private Organisations

Policy

- The Management of SKASC encourages academic staff to enhance knowledge, skills and network with other professionals, thus improving potential for future opportunities.
- The Management recognizes that for development purposes, academic staff need to attend training seminars or workshops conducted in-house and off-site or join professional associations that will enable them to remain abreast of best practices in their respective fields. Thus, the purpose of this policy is to outline company

parameters for attending a variety of in-house and external training. The academic staff is encouraged to join/renew memberships with professional associations of their disciplines.

- In support of this programme, the academic staff is encouraged to:
 - ✓ Attend courses offered by an accredited institution, including e-learning.
 - ✓ Participate and present in workshops, seminars and conferences.
 - ✓ Be a member of professional organizations. Subscribe to the professional magazine(s).

SKASC Grants Application and Evaluation

SKASC will for Grants Application and Evaluation every year in the month of June, to all the academicians to present their areas of specialisation.

Intellectual Property Rights

Introduction

Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) provides the necessary protection and incentives to encourage the discovery and development of new knowledge, product and its applicability and transfer for public benefit. The term Intellectual Property (IP) is broadly defined to include inventions, copyrights, trademarks, and tangible research property. IP includes, but is not limited to, that which is protected by statute or legislation, such as patents, copyrights, trademarks, trade secrets, and plant variety protection certificates. It also includes, but is not limited to, the physical embodiments of intellectual effort, for example, research proposals, models (including business models), machines, devices, designs, apparatus, instrumentation, circuits, computer programmes, visualisations, biological materials, chemicals, other compositions of matter, and plants.

Eligibility Requirements and Application

- Every academic staff is required to undertake research work and publish it.
- Each researcher is allowed to lead only **THREE (3)** Research Grant at any one time. However, he may be a member of more than **THREE (3)** research grants at any one time.
- A new application from researchers who are currently engaged in research grants can only be considered after at least 90% (or during final write-up) of the current research has been completed.
- Application for leave to conduct research activities is subject to the approval of the Management of the SKASC.

- Academic staffs who are engaged in undertaking research work may be given lesser teaching hour load for that current semester/period.
- Academic staff may also be allowed to undertake research jointly with external institution provided that the academic teaching is not jeopardized and is approved by the Management of SKASC
- It is strongly encouraged that researchers share their research work progress and findings in colloquium session(s) organized by the respective faculty

Ownership

SKASC shall be the owner of:

- IP, created by SKASC researcher in the course of his/her employment with SKASC, while utilising SKASC resources.
- IP, where the creation of which has been substantially contributed to by SKASC (or by any third person either on behalf of SKASC or by virtue of an agreement with SKASC) by the provision of resources, facilities, apparatus, supervision, salary or other funding.
- When determining ownership and license rights in IP, SKASC will construe the provision of office space, on-campus training, library facilities, ordinary access to office computers, workstations and software or networks, or salary as constituting a significant use of SKASC resources.
- No agreement on assigning ownership or rights in IP shall be executed by any individual covered by this policy directly with a sponsoring organisation without the prior written approval of the RAC of SKASC. SKASC reserves the sole right to make agreement with sponsoring organisations and to include therein such provisions regarding the ownership and disposition of rights in IP as it deems to be in the interest of SKASC and the stakeholders.
- SKASC staff shall own the IPs of their creations, only if none of the resources of SKASC are being used in the course of creation.

Collaboration and Networking

SKASC promotes interdisciplinary research collaboration through an internal research grant to develop innovative strategies in investigating real-life, novel and complex research areas.

It is also essential for SKASC to build strategic partners with various industries or other institutions. Such collaboration is important as interaction with industries ensures that innovation at SKASC could provide exposure to the originator(s). The participating industry will also benefit as it obtains access to SKASC expertise, facilities and resources.

In addition to the above SKASC encourages staff to collaborate with other local and international institutions and initiate Memorandum of Understanding (MoU). This collaboration not only provides a platform to exchange novel ideas but also to go beyond their disciplines thus enriching their conceptualisations. Such collaboration expands research activities, generates quality publications, enables participation in diverse research projects and broadens insights. Consequently, this collaboration leads to the establishment of a rewarding and productive network of expertise.

Publication

Publication of Thesis

A thesis whether approved or not shall not be published in full without the permission of the Syndicate and the syndicate may grant permission for the publication under certain conditions as may be imposed.

Publication of Research Articles

A candidate may during the course of his / her research publish papers in standard research journals as advised by his /her supervisor, but the thesis as a whole shall not be published without obtaining permission of the syndicate mentioned supra.

Publication Certificate

The research supervisor / convener shall be required to furnish a certificate along with the report of the viva-voce examination, in connection with the suitability of the thesis for publication by the candidate, at a later date in the following format:

CERTIFICATE

This is to certify that in the thesis entitled ‘.....’
submitted by ‘.....’ all the corrections
/ modifications suggested by the examiners have been incorporated and the thesis does
not have any objectionable material. Hence, the thesis is fit for publication, if the candidate
desires so.

Research Article Publication

The objectives of this policy on article publishing are to:

- Create a scholarly environment;
- Encourage publication of articles in peer-reviewed journals as these will provide a stimulating environment for staff in terms of advancing their knowledge and understanding in the wider context of the community of scholars;
- Enhance SKASC capability as a centre of research and education excellence.

Academic staff members are strongly encouraged to publish papers in their areas of expertise in peer-reviewed academic journals. Only articles which have been accepted and published by reputable journals with citation index factors such as Thomson SSCI/SCI/SCIE/AHCI (i.e. SCOPUS/Web of Science) will be considered for promotion.

Policy on Publication

A staff may apply for financial assistance to publish papers in peer-reviewed journals provided that the journal is indexed by Thomson Web of Science (WoS)/SCOPUS. Any journals not indexed by Thomson Web of Science will not be considered.

The principal author making the application must be a staff of SKASC and must have used SKASC as his/her affiliation. In the case of more than one author who are affiliated to SKASC, all the affected authors must use SKASC as their affiliation.

Preparation of papers for journal publication shall be done at the staff's own time and the associated activities should not interfere with his/her scheduled duties.

Seminars, Conferences, Workshops and Exhibition

The academic and support staff may be permitted to present paper, one off-site seminar, conference or workshop subject to the approval by the Management. The event to be attended must have a direct relationship to the job the staff performs. Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) have to be followed as stipulated by Human Resource (HR) Department.

The faculty head should support paper presenter only. The author is required to give a seminar on the paper before attending the conference thus increasing seminars in SKASC.

Research-related conferences and SOPS are facilitated by HR Department. Conferences that publish the proceedings in Scopus/ISI will be of priority to SKASC. However, other reputed peer-reviewed journals may also be considered on a case-by-case basis.

The academic and support staff may also be permitted to join one professional association. The association selected must have a direct relationship to the job the staff performs. The staff must provide a membership-request supporting document that outlines the benefits to be gained by the company as a result of such membership and the association.

To participate in this programme, the staff must submit a request by completing a staff development request form and forward it to his or her Head of Faculty/School/Centre/Academy. Upon approval, the Head shall forward the form to HR Department. HR Department will forward the request to the Management and obtain a final decision. The staff must then submit the following documents to the HR Department after the event:

1. Attendance form
2. Certificate of achievement/completion
3. Photograph(s) of the event(s).

After completing any training, the staff shall perform transfer of training for the benefit of other academic staff through a workshop/seminar (when appropriate). The HR Department will file CD/presentation slides in the staff record.

23.3 Common New Courses for the Academic year 2022-2023

23.3.1 Introduction

With the introduction of the new common courses for the academic year 2022-2023, following courses has been introduced as part of curriculum enhancement and enrichment. The courses are nouvelle in nature and provide a new insight to the journey of learning for students at SKASC.

23.3.1.1 Academic Skills

Academic skills encourage students to become efficient learners. This course provides confidence and enhances critical thinking skills. The primary objective of this course is to develop a range of academic skills and to provide opportunities for practice at Higher education level. Particular attention is given to the facilitation of skill transfer for further study and career development. Additionally, this course helps the students to enhance their skills in higher education system to have smooth progress at the undergraduate level.

The course develops the graduates in enriching the skills on,

- Academic Discourse

- Academic inference
- Academic Strategies
- Composition
- Comprehension

The subject has three credit hours and three contact hours and a portfolio-based assessment will be prepared by the students. As the semester progress, every activity will be compiled and documented by the student as a portfolio. Periodical assessment of the activities will be monitored by the facilitator of this course. The course will provide an opportunity to the learn to learn independently as well as learning together with the class contact hours. Following are the assessments pertaining to this course which in turn reflects the outcome achievement and skill development of a student.

- Whole group sessions
- Nature of Learning
- Seminar classes
- Practical workshops
- Problem based learning
- Movie assignment
- Small group activities during workshops
- Group collaboration outside the class
- Self and Peer assessments
- Group projects and exercises
- Presentation techniques
- MS office at a higher-level learning
- Personal Development Plan
- Report writing
- Time Management skills
- Gantt Chart and schedule of activities

23.3.1.2. Capstone Project

“Learning to Learn” is an important Graduate Attribute. It is required to develop this skill in students so that they continue to acquire on their new knowledge and skills from different ‘on the job experiences’ during their career in industry. This course is a significant part of students’ career in enhancing their skills of learning. An education ‘project’ just does that and may be defined as ‘a purposeful student activity, planned, designed and performed by a student or group of students to solve/ complete the identified problem/task

which require students to integrate the various skills acquired over a period to accomplish higher level cognitive and affective domain outcomes and sometimes the psychomotor domain outcomes as well”. Projects mainly serve this significant purpose of developing learning to learning skills with an aim to develop the following attributes in the students:

- a) Initiative, confidence and ability to tackle new problems.
- b) Sprits of enquiry.
- c) Creativity and innovativeness.
- d) Planning and decision-making skills.
- e) Ability to work in a team and to lead a team.
- f) Ability of self-directed learning which is required for lifelong learning.
- g) Persistence (habit of not giving up quickly and trying different solutions in case of momentary failures, till success is achieved).
- h) Resourcefulness.
- i) Habit of keeping proper records of events and to present a formal comprehensive of report of their work.

Capstone projects are culminating experiences in which students synthesise the competencies acquired over whole programme. In some case they also integrate cross-disciplinary knowledge. Thus, Capstone projects prepare students for entry into a career and can be described as a ‘rite of passage’ or ‘minimal threshold’ through which participants change their status from students to graduate. A capstone project therefore should serve as a synthesis- reflection and integration- to bridge the real-world preparatory experience to real life. Thus, capstone project should have emphasised on integration, experiential learning and real-world problem solving and hence these projects are very important for students. To develop the highly essential industry-oriented skills and competencies in the students, the capstone projects are offered in the beginning of the semester to,

- Integrate the competencies required by the students in the previous and current semesters
- Provide opportunities for interdisciplinary work in talking problems likely to be faced by them in industry which are exciting and challenging.

23.3.1.3. Value Added Courses

With the ever-changing global scenario, the world is competitive and requires high levels of lateral thinking and entrepreneurial skills to cope up with the emerging challenges. Based on the training need analysis, the department has developed value

added courses for the benefit of its own students as well as other students. This helps the department to be distinctive in its own nature.

The value-added courses were established to,

- Provide students an understanding on the industry expectation
- Increase the employable skills
- Develop entrepreneurial skills

The course is not mandatory to qualify for the programme however, the credit earned shall be over and above the total credit requirement prescribed in the curriculum.

The duration of the value-added courses are 30 hours which will be conducted for two hours in a week. The course will have an evaluation system controlled by the controller of Examination. At the end of the course, a completion certificate will be provided to the students and it will also be reflected in the mark statement.

Considering these dimensions, ethics and values have been inculcated as a new concept in the curriculum of SKASC.

23.4 Grievance Redressal Policy

Sri Krishna College of Arts and Science is determined to address any kind of student's grievances and to take necessary actions. In this regard, this policy establishes the guidelines and standards for student grievances.

Grievance redressal Committee

The Grievance redressal Committee shall monitor the following,

The Committee shall determine the following aspects before accepting the application.

- Timeliness
- Grievance is not a resubmission of the earlier submitted or verdict grievance.
- The grievance relating to academic assessment or grade appeal or extenuating circumstances will be directed to the Controller of Examination
- Grievance seeking disciplinary action
- Grievance relating to ragging will be directed to Anti ragging committee
- Grievance relating to sexual harassment will be directed to Internal Complaints Committee (ICC)
- Grievances relating to academic issues, he/she will be directed to the concerned department.
- Any other grievance not listed above.

Head of the Institution will personally attend to the Grievances of any sort reported by the student and ensure the settlement of the issue at the earliest.

Procedure

- To receive the application of the students and process them further.
- To attend all applications relating to the grievances of the students.
- To entertain and consider the grievances of the students, by providing the opportunities to of hearing.
- To hear all the concerned parties and settle the grievances as early as possible.
- It shall make efforts to settle the disputes amicably.
- To prepare Minutes and Action Taken Report of the meeting and submit to the concerned personnel.
- Meeting to redress the grievances should be addressed within 15 days of receiving the application.

Quorum

The quorum for the meeting of the GRC shall be three including the Head of the Institution.

Confidentiality of grievances

All grievances shall be considered confidential and shall not be divulged to individuals or organization unless required by law. All materials developed in the course of the grievance investigation and hearing shall be placed in a confidential, non-personnel file to be maintained. None of these materials shall be removed from the file or copied unless needed for compliance with appropriate administration or any legal requirements.

Internal Redressal Committee

As per Bharathiar University Regulation, an Internal Redressal Committee within the department shall function as a redressal cell to deliberate upon and redress the grievances of the students relating to internal assessment. The Composition of Internal Redressal Committee members are as follows:

- Senior faculty – 2 Members

evidence, investigation and speedy trial of offences through designated Special Courts. The Act encompasses the child whose age is below eighteen years of age. It defines various forms of sexual abuse like - penetrative assault, non-penetrative assault, sexual harassment and pornography, he said and called upon the students to be cautious in forwarding any obscene messages as the person forwarding will also be part of the cyber crime. Trinity Mirror scribe M Rafi Ahmed took the session in a different perspective making it a 'Talent Promotion Committee' wherein he urged both the parents and teachers to tap the

Coimbatore: People from all walks of life came together on Saturday to remove more than 300kg plastic waste dumped by devotees near the Marudhamalai Subramania Swamy Temple. As many as 50 people, including students of the Sri Krishna College and Rotaract Club of CUG took part in the initiative, organized by NGO Koval Kulanag Padhugappu Anaiappu on the occasion of the International Mountain Day. The volunteers, carrying gunny bags, gathered in the foothills around 10.30am and started collecting trash left behind by visitors. Most of the waste was found near the parapet of the steps leading to the temple. They collected 13 bags and food containers. The collected waste was handed over to the local body for scientific disposal. R Manikandan, coordi-

nator of Koval Kulanag Padhugappu Anaiappu, said that visitors, temple administration and the district administration are equally responsible for accumulation of banned plastic in public places. "The temple surroundings are ecologically sensitive zones as a large number of wild animals visit the place frequently. Stringent restriction should be in place to prevent plastic waste being dumped there. The district administration should enforce the ban against single-use plastic. The temple administration should place sufficient bins and ensure that devotees use them. Elephants, monkeys and wild boars that visit the area may eat plastic that block their digestive system," he said. "Temple authorities said that bins are damaged by wild boars. We are planning to install some bins that cannot be accessed by wild boars," Manikandan added.
